DUNS SCOTUS
Séamus Mulholland OFM PhD

It is certainly true that the medieval Franciscan theologian-philosopher Duns Scotus [1266-1308] is probably the most difficult of the medieval theologian-philosophers to grasp. His soubriquet 'The Subtle Doctor' evinces to his complexity and yet while very challenging, Duns Scotus is the most rewarding of the medieval thinkers.

Interwoven with profound philosophical and theological thought and insight on matters as varied as Being, Intuition, Cognition, Self-Change, Individuation, Will, Trinity, Incarnation, Sacraments, the role and place of Mary, there is an extraordinary spirituality of creation and the human person which is deeply rooted in the Franciscan Intellectual and Spiritual Tradition.

This course explores the mind and the *heart* of Duns Scotus to reveal not just one of the great theological and philosophical masters of the Middle Ages but also one of the great spiritual masters of Franciscanism.

Séamus is Director of the MA Franciscan Studies programme. He lectures in Biblical Studies, Philosophy and Franciscan Studies. He has published extensively on Franciscan Theology and Philosophy and has also written on Biblical Literature and Philosophy.
